Tapping birch

Each spring for about 10 years now my family and I enjoy drinking birch sap that we tap from our trees. I make my own spouts out of 5/8" pieces of dowel that's cut to about 3 inches in length and tapered on one end to fit into a 1/2" hole that's bored into the tree. I cut a notch for the pail handle and drill a 1/8" hole through the center of the spout, the rest is now up to the tree. A good idea is to add a cheese cloth cover to ward off moths and flies that will be attracted to the slightly sweet water.

Birch water offers numerous nutrients, especially vitamins and

minerals. With a little research I found that one 10.2 ounce (300ml) bottle contains 9 calories, 2 carbs, 3 grams of sugar, 2% Daily Value (DV) of calcium, 95% DV of magnesium, 130% manganese and 3% DV of zinc. I haven't boiled the birch sap down to syrup, though if one did it would take 80 gallons to get one gallon of syrup. Birch sap has only half the sugar content of sugar maple sap. We also freeze it in plastic juice containers for mixing with frozen orange juice to be enjoyed throughout the summer. Once the short sap flowing season is over I remove the spout and tap a 1/2" diameter dowel into the hole to permanently seal it up.

After more than 10 years at the Goat, it's time for me to pursue a different kind of writing career—the creative writing that has always been my passion. I am also looking forward to having more free time and spending more of it with my family. As a result, the Goat is up for sale and I am looking for a buyer to take over what I am proud to have built and been a part of over the years.

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Local veteran spearheads "Banners of Remembrance"

Inspired by the grad banners that hung on lampposts downtown last year, Peter Addis is hoping to start another tradition: hanging banners of local veterans in the lead-up to Remembrance Day each year.

"It's something that's close to my heart. We need to get this message across that we do have people in the Robson Valley that are veterans, that have changed their lives for the better of the country. I thought, what better way to remember these people than doing this?"

Addis himself was a front-line infantryman with the British Armed Forces for 14 Years. He was deployed to Bosnia in 1994 under the UN and a number of other places around the world on active duty.

He said people can sponsor a 30x60in banner for a relative or community member for \$140 from a Canadian veteran-owned company. The banner will have a photograph of the veteran, name and service details. He said any veteran living in the Robson Valley or who used to live here is eligible to be part of the "Banners of Remembrance" project.

Addis hopes to have the banners up between mid-October and November 12th.

At their April 27th meeting, Council approved the Legion's request to hang the banners during that time and to have public works hang the banners.

Timely tax credit

I filed my family's taxes last week and noticed a reminder in Turbotax regarding claiming workfrom-home expenses. It was a friendly reminder for the millions of people who have worked from home this year and don't know about the latest deduction method.

While I'm happy there's deductions for working from home, as a result of the work-from-home trend, office buildings and normally bustling downtowns are deserted while people raid their

Restaurants are some of the most vulnerable businesses during COVID-19, especially in our tourism and highway-traffic reliant towns. Since March 29, restaurants have been restricted to take-out or patio service only, squeezing them further. The Goat recently partnered up with Tourism Valemount to produce a take-out flyer listing Valemount restaurants that are offering takeout. There were 20 food establishments on that flyer. 20 sources of take-out in a town of 1,000 people. Thank goodness for the 600+ extra pipeline workers in town right now or we'd probably see permanent closures.

Tax deductions should do at least one of two things: remove inequities and encourage behaviour that, in the end, saves the country money (or makes it more efficient). Offering a tax credit for eating out as long as pandemic restrictions are in place makes perfect sense. You could cap it at, say, \$700 per person. If it's during work hours you're allowed to write it off, whether you're working from home or from the office. Plus, eating regularly isn't just good for the restaurant, it's also good for your concentration at work and leads to greater productivity.

We keep hearing about how much money people are saving during the pandemic and how many restaurants are closing permanently.

Let's show our restaurant staff some love and advocate for a tax credit that's a win-win.

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
Call for input through **COVID-19 Survey**

Napoleon - What If ...?

Napoleon Bonaparte doesn't come up much in conversation these days, which is hardly surprising given that he has been dead for two centuries. On the other hand, this week it will be exactly 200 years since he died, so maybe we could make an exception just this once.

People often compare Napoleon to Hitler, another dictator who allegedly tried to 'conquer the world', but that thought never crossed Hitler's mind. His real ambitions were in eastern Europe, where he would get 'lebensraum' (living space) for the German population and access to strategic resources like oil. Whereas Napoleon thought much bigger.

Apart from Britain and Scandinavia, there was hardly a country in Europe that didn't get a visit from Napoleon's armies. The campaign that made Napoleon famous in France was his conquest of Egypt, and at one time he even contemplated following in Alexander the Great's footsteps and invading India.

As he explained to Dr. Barry O'Meara, the Irish doctor who looked after him during his final years in exile on St. Helena, "Had I known in 1806 or 1808 [that a 'ship-ofthe-line' can carry 80 tons of drinking water in tanks], I would have sent an army of 38,000 men to invade India."

The plan was abandoned because nobody told Napoleon that those warships could carry enough drinking water for such a large army. He thought they couldn't, and he never asked. So he wasn't infallible, but he was certainly ambitious – and if the plan had succeeded, it might have ended British rule in India 140 years early.

Napoleon was certainly responsible for millions of unnecessary deaths. Around three million soldiers and a million civilians were killed in twenty years of the 'Napoleonic Wars', but by the end France was back to its original borders. Yet it's not only the French who still see him in a positive light.

Hitler was a squalid fascist who built death camps; Napoleon was a child of the Enlightenment and the French Revolution who believed he was bringing liberal values to the people he conquered. He shamefully re-legalised slavery (banned by the Revolution), but wherever he went in Europe he overthrew the feudal order and enforced religious tolerance and secular

Consider his plans for England, if the cross-Channel invasion he was preparing in 1803-05 had come to pass. He told O'Meara in St. Helena:

"Four days would have brought me to London....One battle lost, the capital would have been in my power....I would have said 'Assemble in London deputies from the people to fix upon a constitution....I would have declared the [end of the monarchy], abolished the nobility, proclaimed liberty, freedom, and equality.

"Think you, that in order to keep the [king on his throne] your rich citizens, merchants, and others of London, would have consented to sacrifice their riches, their houses, their families, and all their dearest interests, especially when....I only came to [get rid of the king] and to give them liberty?...

"Your principal people have too much to lose by resistance, and your masses too much to gain by a change....If they supposed that I wanted to render England a province of France, then indeed [patriotism could have worked wonders in a guerilla war]. But I would have formed a republic according to your own

But what would England be without the royal soap opera and Clown Prince Boris Johnson? It would be like America without Donald Trump. Alternate history sucks.

Remembering on 5th, aero-lighting, washroom grant, full-time bylaw officer

Council held its regularly scheduled meeting on April 27.

Audit

The meeting began with a lengthy presentation of the Audited Financial Statements from 2020 by KPMG.

Remembrance

Council directed staff to work with members of the Royal Canadian Legion to place banners

of remembrance on lamp posts on 5th Avenue. Royal Canadian Legion Branch 266 president Peter Addis asked that banners featuring local veterans be hung between mid-October and mid-November. Council moved to support the idea.

Accounts payable

Council received the March 2021 accounts payable report for information.

Airport lighting repairs

Council approved \$66,500 towards the airport lighting repairs using \$37,000 from the COVID-19 Airport Relief and \$29,500 from the COVID 19 Safe Restart Grant and approved sole sourcing the job to Signal Electric Ltd.

"It's something we don't take lightly when it comes to sole sourcing," said Mayor Owen Torgerson.

Pearson said he hopes efforts will be taken to minimize the cost

CAO Wayne Robinson said that the reason the request is on the books now is because the company is passing through the area, and is one of the few companies that can complete the work.

"We won't have to worry about extra mobilizing costs that wouldn't be necessary otherwise," said Robinson.

Municipal sewer line clearing

Council asked staff to negotiate a contract for 3 years of municipal sewer line cleaning, with an option to renew for a further two years with Northern Lites Technology (2021) Ltd.







Andreas Thoni's first crack at building trails was in Jasper as a kid, and the trails he and his school friends built in the bush were constantly being torn down and erased by park staff. 20 years later, people pay his company to build infrastructure in some of the most sensitive and remote parks in the province.

When Andreas moved to Valemount in 1999, he was still in high school, and he couldn't believe his good fortune: trail building here was welcome.

Thoni's company Robson Design Build is winning contracts around the British Columbia to build new trails, bridges and infrastructure in the most remote and sensitive regions.

"When we moved to Valemount we started building trails, because we had the freedom to do so and building trails is how this whole business has evolved," he said.

Thoni's company, initially called Robson

Energy Services, started as an oilfield equipment rental company in 2012, but his passion for the oil sector wasn't strong. In 2013 he began working on trails at the Valemount Bike Park (a project he set in motion by raising funds to have a master development plan drafted; a downhill trail he built bears his name).

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The company, now called Robson Design Build, has set up shop on Valemount's burgeoning 5th Avenue, right next to Underwriter's Insurance and across from the bank.

"We don't really need a storefront; it's not integral to how we get our business, but we're enjoying being downtown. It's super convenient," said Thoni.

"It's nice being amongst everyone else who's working right beside you, you just feel inclined to work hard," said Jenna Jackson, Thoni's partner.

The business, powered by an ensemble of highly skilled locals, is a Valemount success

ory with a pretty low profile. Andreas Thoni seems to be the Chief xecutive Officer but he prefers to call himself n estimator. His partner, Jackson, plays a role panning human resources, safety, accountant nd administration. Thoni and Jackson play own their roles and play up the host of cals, like Sean Carson, Tom Jamin and Zac uttiman whose special skills help pull off ajor projects in out of the way places. Our construction started very humbly with ails here and bridges; now it's expanding a pretty rapid pace. We're focusing n institutional, commercial and civil onstruction," said Thoni.

To date the company has specialized in ridges over streams of all types, suspension, eel, I-beam, and aluminum truss. The ompany's first big bridge project was a edestrian bridge on Valemount's hiking and king trail system over Swift Creek. Growing up in Valemount has given Thoni a miliarity with using helicopters

to bring materials into remote locations and that knowledge has been put to good use.

West Coast Trail

While the West Coast Trail has yet to reopen in the wake of the pandemic, Thoni and his crew have built and finished a massive bridge on the route, the third largest pedestrian suspension bridge in British Columbia.

The bridge cuts out a notorious section, making the challenging trail a little more manageable.

While on site, Thoni's crew, the only other people on the trail for kilometres, played a role in helping a number of injured parties.

Akamina-Kishinena

The project Thoni is most proud of is the rebuilding of infrastructure in Akamina-Kishinena Park adjacent to Waterton Lakes National Park in the south east corner of the province.

The provincial park had been ravaged by a wildfire, and Robson Design Build won the contract to build it back.

"That project had a really good team on it, we executed it perfectly to schedule and we did really well on it," he said.

It included nine timber bridges and an extraordinary ranger cabin.

"It was just a cabin but it had all the amenities of your home, the picture perfect off grid cabin. Solar, a gravity water system and a full propane shower," he said.

The project played to one of the company's strengths: using helicopters for remote access.

Thoni said that projects that require helicopters are intimidating for contractors without experience using them.

Industrial strength

Thoni said that his company has recently started renting a plot of land in the Valemount Industrial Park.

"The board is very accommodating for businesses that have unique needs and it's helped us out," he said.

Many of the bridges the company makes require big timbers. Thoni said he looks forward to being adjacent to the new Valemount mill under construction at the industrial park.

Cultivating local talent

Jackson said that while the projects aren't usually based in Valemount, they use local subtrades, source local supplies and do as much as possible to keep the economic benefit local.

"We hope to provide some pretty good work opportunities in the future as we grow the local talent," said Jackson.

This season, the Valemount Bike Park will have its own regular maintenance team. Since the bike park's inception, Randy Pruden and other irregular staff and volunteers have been maintaining the local trail system, but the 2021 season will be the first year a regular maintenance crew will be working on the trails. Andru McCracken and Stephanie McDonald will join Pruden caretake the roughly 60 kilometres of Valemount Bike Park trails.

"This crew could not have come at a better time, "said VARDA Manger Curtis Pawliuk. "This year's windstorms were catastrophic to the trails. We have never seen this much destruction and debris from downed trees and limbs."

He said the crew has its work cut out for it playing catch up removing debris and organics from the trail surfaces, which he says will still need the help of local volunteers to complete. Once the initial spring cleaning is complete, the crew will then focus on repairs and upkeep such as trail tread patching, drainage repairs and general improvements to the quality the

trails are known for, he says.


Pawliuk says trails are occasionally closed during maintenance, but the majority of the time a sign will be hung at the trailhead if a crew is working.

Tourism Valemount and the Valemount Community Forest have been contributing financially to the maintenance of the trail system for a few years, Pawliuk says, and this year, the program is getting a big boost from the Columbia Basin Trusts "Basin Job Experience Program" which made the hiring of two additional employees possible.

Many trails are already open though Pawliuk warns of several downed trees over the network.

"Riders are urged to ride with caution as we work on clearing them out."



Potatoes-Basic of Growing

I have talked about potatoes in former columns but talked mostly about different varieties or how to help prevent scab. In the past few weeks, I have been asked many times about growing potatoes, so I will devote this entire column and the next to growing potatoes.

The first thing I want to explain is that storing potatoes together in a root cellar and having them cross is an "old wives' tale". The way we usually grow potatoes is by "cloning". We take a piece from the parent stock (the seed potato) and plant it the next year, so we will get the identical variety again, no matter how it is stored. The only way to cross potato varieties is by saving the little seed pods on the top of the plants (the ones that look like miniature green tomatoes) and planting those seeds the following year. That is where new varieties come from.

If we understand just how potatoes grow, we will better understand just how to grow them!

The piece of potato that we use as seed can be used whole if around the size of an egg or it can be cut into two or three pieces if it is a large potato. The main thing to remember is that you should have two "eyes" on each piece of seed. If you are cutting up larger potatoes for seed, it is best to do so about two days to a week before planting and then lay them out to "heal" in a basement, shop or shed where they will get enough light to sprout, but not enough direct sunlight to shrivel up and they are protected from freezing.

Once the eyes begin to produce short sprouts and the first sign of little white roots, they can be planted and watered in. The sprout is going to be the stem and the white roots around it will go down into the soil to feed the plant. If the soil is cold and damp, there is a chance of the seed rotting. If the soil is moderately dry, you can plant a few rows for early potatoes around the first of May and the main crop around the end of May. If the main crop matures too soon in the season, they do not seem to keep in storage as well. I always try to time them to mature around the middle to end of September and harvest them a few weeks after the tops die down.

As I plant my potatoes in rows, I usually cultivate the entire patch first, being sure not to add any fresh manure or lime or I would be asking for "scab". Then I measure out rows about 3' (1M) apart and stretch out a string over the first row. Next, I dig all the holes about 8" (20cm) deep and 1' (30cm) apart along the entire row. Then I throw a handful of peat moss and a handful of alfalfa pellets in each hole. The peat moss will help make the soil more acid and prevent scab, and the alfalfa pellets give the young plant a boost of natural nitrogen get off to a good start. Alfalfa Pellets can be found at any feed store as they are used for animal feed. Then I place a seed piece with the sprout pointing up in each hole and cover the seed piece with only about 2" (5cm) of soil. (I go down the row with a hoe, just

pulling a bit of earth over each seed piece.) Then, if your soil is sandy or dry, water them in well. If the soil is damp or it looks like rain, leave them alone.

Next week, I will cover how the potatoes grow and how to care for them during the growing season.
